- 2. The Chairman signed the minutes of the 2010 Annual Parish Meeting as a correct record
- 3. Annual reports and accounts:
 - a) Report from the Chairman of the Parish Council Due to the parish meetings now taking place on the first Tuesday of the month, this has meant that the parish accounts are not as yet completed and will be presented to the council at the Annual General Meeting.  - Zero percentage on council tax this year and next year
 - Norfolk County Council was reported in the EDP as being a successful council and was congratulated by the leader of the labour party
 - Apprenticeships 81 apprenticeships will be created by Norse with the support of £891,000 from Norfolk County Council and a further £4 million from companies wishing to support the scheme
 - The number of telephone numbers to Norfolk County Council services is being reduced.

 - £4.2 million has been spent on road improvements
 - The northern distributor road has been approved by government which is costing £89 million with a further £10 million contribution by Norfolk County Council

 - d) Report from the Police The Police did not have a representative present so the report was read out by the Chairman see report 3d


Earsham Parish Council Chairman's Report 2012

This last ten months since being elected chairman started off being a little daunting with the departure of both Jane Pearce who had been clerk for over 30 years and the previous chairman Gordon Wrigley who was always a font of knowledge on parish council matters. The appointment of our current clerk Linda Lyng has proved to be a bonus for the council as she has modernised our procedures and has provided advice when needed to help me fulfil my role as chairman.

The parish council has this year been discussing the provision of affordable housing in Earsham with Saffron housing who will hopefully be providing four new dwellings that will be in keeping with the character of the village in the not too distant future. We are also looking into the possibility of providing a new village hall with better facilities for residents but this is still a long way from being a certainty.

For the Queens Diamond jubilee we are planning to provide a seating area adjacent to the river which will hopefully be completed by June 2nd. Now that the travellers have been moved the underpass has been cleared to enable walkers to take advantage Five Acre Lane. We have also opened negotiations to reinstate a footpath on land behind the new school as this facility has been sorely missed by several residents.

In light of the current financial situation the Parish Council has tried where possible to ease matters for residents by keeping the precept static and not increasing rents for the playing field and bowls club. Hopefully we can continue to improve Earsham for its' residents and are always willing to listen to new proposals to enable us to do this.

District Councillor Report, 2011-12

Earsham

The Joint Core Strategy for the Greater Norwich area (South Norfolk, Norwich & Broadland) identifies Earsham as a "service village", i.e. one suitable for some additional housing, typically 10-20 houses. The Parish Council has been consulted twice on both the development boundary and the sites within the parish proposed for development by landowners. The following proposals for Earsham have now been agreed by SNC but consultation on this will take place in June/July so is by no means finalized. It will all be subject to further consideration by SNC in the light of the consultation responses. It will then have to be examined by an independent inspector, and finally the sites proposed will still require planning consent:

- 1. A site on the west side of School Road, south of Queensway has been selected for c. 20 houses;
- 2. The development boundary has been drawn to exclude most of Temple Bar area as this is shown to be within the Environment Agency's flood zone;
- 3. A plot of land adjacent to "Sunrise" in Church Road has been included within the development boundary.

As regards the possible plan for relocation of village hall and playing field to the western end of the village, the view of officers is that this could still be considered, but outside this current process once the Parish Council's plans are more advanced. If the Parish Council still wishes to pursue this, I suggest that when rough proposals are available, agreed with the landowner, I will arrange a meeting with the Planning officers at SNC to discuss the possible way forward. I can say more about this at your May Parish Council meeting.

During the year, I have also been pleased to support the plan for a few affordable houses to be built in Church Road and I am told that an application for planning consent is imminent.

The Council has frozen it's share of the Council Tax for the coming year and I supported that after my proposal for a 2% cut in Council Tax was rejected.

During the year, I have continued to be a member of the Planning Committee, the Local Plan Steering Group, the Environment and Development Scrutiny Committee, and the Waveney Valley Neighbourhood Board.

Finally, may I thank the Parish Council and Clerk for their support during the year.

Since I was here 12 months ago it would be fair to say that the 2011/12 season has been the most successful for Earsham Football Club in many years. We formed our Reserve Team at the start of the season, which has been managed by Matthew (Skinny) Hall, who has lived most of his life in Earsham. To be totally honest we were not sure how successful they would be. The Reserves are comfortably in 7th place in Division 3 of the Lowestoft League. They have won 10 drawn 4 and lost 8 with 2 games left to play. Considering this is only their first season together, they have done the Club proud. What has also been very pleasing this season is that we have a number of players playing for the Reserves who have now started to break into the first team as well!

Our First Team, managed by Dave Todd, who lives in Earsham, have just won, at the weekend, Div 2 of the Lowestoft League with 2 games still to go. We have played 24 games, won 20, drawn 2 and lost only 2 with a goal difference of +51. As you can imagine this was cause for great excitement and celebration on Saturday and we will continue to enjoy it over the coming weeks!

The Club itself has expanded this season and continues to thrive with much support from the village itself. A good number of our players live in Earsham, or very near by but we are always on the lookout for more, so I would also say that if any of you know of any talented footballers that live in the village or near by, please put them in touch with us. It has been quite touching at times to speak to people from Earsham, people who I have not met or spoken to before, telling me how proud they are of their village football team and putting Earsham back on the map. We certainly get plenty of supporters turn up to watch our matches, home and away. The Club have had several very successful fund raising events in the last 12 months, in particular a large raffle, a horse racing night and a quiz night, all held within the village. It has also been pleasing to see a good number of the players and supporters from both the First Team and Reserves after every match, home or away coming back to the Queens Head and socialising together. Whilst talking about support and without wishing to embarrass your lady chairman too much, I would publicly like to say a big thank you to Lynda and John at the Queens Head for all the support they give us.

Last week I was informed by the Norfolk FA that Earsham FC have been awarded the FA Charter Standard, which has taken us almost 2 years to achieve. Basically we have been vetted by the FA and proved that we are a well run, financially stable and fair playing football club. As a Club we do have a good disciplinary record. This is a prestigious award of which we are very proud. I am aware that other clubs have applied for the Charter Standard and not been successful.

Earsham Bowls Club Finance Report to Parish Meeting Year Ended 31 - 10 - 11

The Bowls Club enjoyed a successful year on the bowling green but not a successful financial one due to making a small loss of £172 due to high increase costs of soil etc.

Total Income for the year of £2,653 was £740 lower than the previous year. The Race Night and Funday were again our two major fundraising events. At £419, the Race Night was £330 lower than last year but it is now a shared event with the playing field committee, the Funday, at £360, showed a reduction of £389 due to the event being cancelled and re-run at a later date.

Total expenditure of £2,825 was higher than the previous year by £132. The main increase was in green maintenance costs from £955 to £1,447 an increase of £492 which was partly offset by saving on insurance of £300.

The deficit decreased our bank balances carried forward at the year end to a £3,778. It was voted at the AGM to increase yearly subscriptions from £14 to £ 17 for the new season

Following the reconstruction of the league to only one division of thirteen teams the club started preseason training with anticipation of having a much better season as eight of the teams would be from last years second division. However before a ball was kicked top side Wortham were to withdraw from the league leaving twelve sides , this would still give us eight more league games than the previous two years. Annual Report 2011/12

As reported at last years annual meeting it comes as no surprise that the Village Hall has lost a substantial amount of money at the end of the current financial year.

The financial results for the year to the end of February reflects the declining usage of the hall with a deficit of £1,087, which compared to last years deficit of £966 which also included a reduced bingo income. Total income for year without any bingo income was actually up by £226 and expenditure was also lower than the previous year by approx £200 which has helped to keep the loss from getting any bigger. The last year has also seen the cost of playing music in village halls go up from £49 to £102. As a result of the deficit the funds carried forward have reduced to £3,447 and as was said in last years report this could be extinguished in three years time unless another regular booking of the hall can be found.

Report 2012

The Earsham Scout Group provides Scouting activities for 35 young people from Earsham and the surrounding area.

Our aim is to promote the development of young people in achieving their full physical, intellectual, social and spiritual potential, as individuals, as responsible citizens and as members of their local, national and international communities.

We do this through a balanced programme tailored to each sections age and abilities.

Beaver Scouts (6 to 8 years) are the youngest section of the Scouting family. Their activities are based around making things, outdoor activities, singing, playing games, going out on visits, investigating nature, listening to stories, learning how to be safe and most importantly, making new friends.

Cub Scouts (aged 8 to $10^{1}/_{2}$ years) continue to develop these themes through Badges and Challenge Award schemes. Cub Scouts will get a chance to try lots of different activities like swimming, music, exploring, nature and collecting. There are a range of badges available which Cub Scouts can wear on their uniforms to show everyone how well they're doing. Cub Scouts also get to go on trips and days out, to places like the zoo, theme parks or a farm. Our cubs take part in a District camp with cubs from other Packs.

Scouts (aged 10¹/₂ to 14 years) take part in a wide range of activities as part of their programme. Participation rather than meeting set standards is the key approach, and for the Scout who wants to be recognised for their achievements there are a number of Challenge Awards and Activity Badges. Scouts take part in a Balanced Programme that helps them to find out about the world in which they live, encourages them to know their own abilities and the importance of keeping fit, and helps develop their creative talents. Being outdoors is important, and half the programme is given over to taking part in traditional Scouting skills, such as camping, survival and cooking, as well as a wider spectrum of adventurous activities. This year our scouts have taken part in camping, hiking and cooking competitions. In January they took part in a District night hike through Dunwich forest in very cold conditions having to undertake various tasks at set bases such as tent pitching, compass and navigation, semaphore signalling, emergency stretcher and First-aid.

Explorer Scouts (16 to 18 years) although we do not operate an Explorer Unit at the moment as we have no Leader, members can join other units within the Waveney Valley District. Explorers are very much self-programming but are encouraged to develop activities that are more adventurous and also give service to the community.

As a Group we have taken part in various District Activities including St Georges Day Parade which we organised last year on behalf of all groups in the Waveney Valley. We were grateful for help that we received from the local community with this. We also had a stall at the Annual Village Fête.

In order to move the group forward a new Group Executive has been formed with the help of parent representatives, and has prioritised the following needs of the group:

- a) to improve the finances of the Group, including better fund raising
- b) to develop leadership resources (at present we do not have a Beaver Leader, currently the Beavers are being run by the Cub Scout Leader with parent help). We are actively seeking a new Beaver Leader and hope to have someone in place during this summer term.
- c) to repair and make improvements to the Headquarters. At present we need to renew and make secure a rear safety exit door that has been damaged and repair flooring. Future plans include improvement to toilet facilities. We would like to apply to the Parish Council for any help with this.

For many years we have operated a Waste paper scheme by use of a skip provided by M White and funded by Norfolk County Council. Unfortunately due to our landowner insisting on a weight limit on the bridge leading to our H.Q., this has been suspended. We are now looking at the possibility of re-siting this Skip, as we wish to respect the landowners wishes.

As part of our commitment to encourage our members to help in the community we would like to offer our services for any appropriate project that the council may wish, (e.g. work party to tidy up an area such as village half or playground or general litter pick etc.

Annual Report to the Parish Meeting of Earsham Parish Council

Tuesday 3rd April 2012

Since taking over the editorship in June last year I have tried to keep to the successful format that that my predecessor Peter Hayes had used.

The format will not change in the coming year but it may look different as I have a few ideas, one of which you will see on the front page of the May Issue.

Report to Parish Council from Mrs Sue Armstrong, Head Teacher, Earsham C.E.V.A. Primary School

I am delighted to be sending you this report as head teacher having been appointed as from 1st April 2012. We have also welcomed three new members of teaching staff, an additional mid day supervisor and two new learning support workers to the school team this year

It has been a busy year for the school. The transition from First school to Primary status was completed in September and our year 5 children have been a credit to the school. They have acted as excellent role models to the younger children and have enhanced the outside learning environment by planting and caring for seven fruit trees. We are working alongside other Primary schools to ensure that our youngsters will be confident and ready when they leave us in 2013 to flourish at their chosen High school.

The outside area of the school has continued to be developed over the year and we are presently waiting for our field to be marked with a 200m running track, ready for the Olympics. There will also be two rounders pitches so that we can invite other Primary schools to come and enjoy our facilities. In the Autumn term we will have a football pitch that can be used for 5 a side competitions.

The children will also be benefiting from a Wildlife area, complete with pond and a cordwood hide with a green roof. The area will be completely fenced off and accessed at the bottom of the school field. A working party of dedicated parents have drawn up the plans and are eagerly awaiting the installation of the fencing so that work can begin. The children will be able to be part of the project and will be able to see firsthand how much work goes into developing the environment around them. They have already started to take a huge interest in the school environment and show great respect and care for it.

During the summer term the following afterschool clubs will be offered to the children, gardening, computer, street dance and music. We are always on the lookout for good quality after school clubs and would be interested to hear from any organisations that may be able to offer extracurricular activities. We also now have our outside display board and would be very happy to advertise any news or activities that would benefit the village.

We have continued to enjoy our partnership with the church and the community and look forward to building on these relationships in the future months. The Christmas Fayre at the school was a huge success and we were so grateful for the support we received. The school is looking forward to being part of The Earsham Festival celebrations.

Over the year the children have raised money for the following charities, Help for Heroes, Children in Need, Smile, Christian Aid and Sports Relief .We as a staff have been very proud of how compassionate, sharing and caring the children are. They are presently hoping that their bid for money raised last year by Bungay/Halesworth pyramid primary schools will secure some money for Water Aid and NSPCC. The year 5 children have produced a very powerful and persuasive power point presentation to deliver to the High school on 23rd April.

Earsham CEVA Primary school continues to be a vibrant, happy learning environment with a clear simple school vision. Learning and development for all, through, challenge, nurture and enjoyment.
